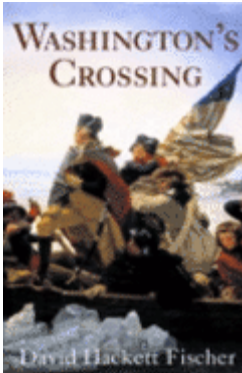

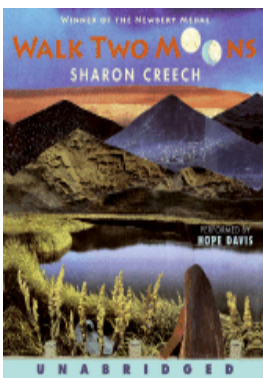
- Adult--***Washington’s Crossing*** by David Hackett Fischer;



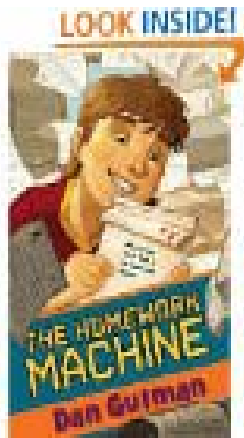
- Teens--***Dunk*** by David Lubar;



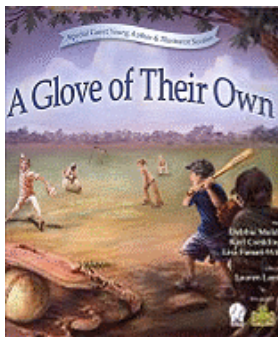
- Tweens (grades 5 & 6)—***Walk Two Moons*** by Sharon Creech;

On **Wednesday, May 12, 2010 at 7:30 pm, adults and teens** are invited to join local author Robert A. Mayers who will offer a presentation on the life of a foot soldier in the American Revolution. This soldier passed directly through Basking Ridge and camped in this area on his way to Yorktown with Rochambeau's column. The book is titled ***War Man: the True Story of a Citizen-Soldier who Fought from Quebec to Yorktown*** and tells of Mr. Mayers' ancestor, John Allison a New York farmer in the Continental Army, who camped at Jockey Hollow during the winter of 1779-1780.

Mr. Mayers is an active member of 10 historical societies where he is a frequent speaker and contributor to publications. Mayers served as combat officer in the Navy and Marine Corps.
