Bending or Breaking the Guardrails of American Democracy

For 249 years the American republic has faced many challenges as to what its democracy means and to whom its Constitutional privileges apply. Given highly publicized challenges that American democracy faces today, this lecture series looks at several thematic chapters with case studies to understand their historic precursors. Some of these chapters bent the guardrails, while others broke them – at least for a time period and for specific groups of people. Their legacies and lessons may help understand their current manifestations and enhance public debate and resolution:

1. Peaceful Transfer of Power: 1800 / 1824 / 1876 / 2000 / 2020

2. Relocation & Internment: from Indian Removal to Japanese Internment

- 3. Immigration Restrictions & Deportations: from Gilded Age Exclusion to WWI-era Deportation and Postwar Exclusions
- 4. From Citizens to Subjects: African Americans from Emancipation to Jim Crow Segregation
 - 5. Robber Barons & Oligarchs: from the Gilded Age to the Information Age

6. Protecting the Guardrails of American Democracy: Where can Reforms Take Us Today?
